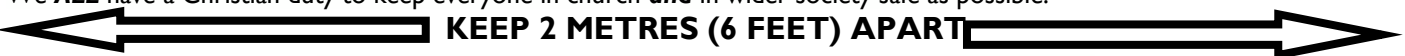
Prayer as you watch a Livestream Mass:

+++++ **COVID LATEST: STILL IN LOCKDOWN** +++++

Now that the Government has announced its plan to ease lockdown restrictions gradually over the next four months, we may all rightly be thankful. That may mean 'nearly over', but by definition it certainly means 'not yet over'. Therefore, very little can change just yet. It is of course indoor meetings that are most strictly controlled because they carry more risk than being outside. This means that 2 metre distancing, stewarding and cleaning, sanitiser, track and trace and face masks over mouth and nose MUST continue for months yet. We have done very well as a community in all this: we must not slacken off now. The virus is still active, still infecting people. FR STEPHEN WRITES: Abraham's faith is tested by God asking him to sacrifice his own son. He reluctantly prepares to do this, but God stops him. Now not only has God seen his faith but Abraham realises the importance of it too. Atop another mountain, centuries later, the voice of God is heard again, witnessing to the Sonship of Jesus. Here, in the Transfiguration, Jesus's glory is revealed. But the sacrifice is yet to come. This is Jesus, God the Son but He will become the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world. Just as Abraham's faith allowed God's will to be done, so will Jesus's. Abraham offers the ram and becomes the father of a great nation. Jesus offers Himself (atop the hill of calvary) so that all might enter the kingdom of Heaven, the eternal nation of God's people, forgiven and saved. Hill tops are places that give us a new perspective. No wonder it is on hill tops that God reveals to us His glory, that we might see things in a very different way...

FR PETER REFLECTS: On 2nd March, the feast of St Chad, the Archbishop will celebrate a mass in the Cathedral for all victims of the pandemic. It is a comfort to recall that our local Saint, John Henry Newman, had a remarkable ability to, as Jesus did, "dwell amongst" those who had lost loved ones. He wrote many letters to console individuals and families – especially if he could not meet with them directly. Newman advises us that everyone grieves in his or her own way. Each person needs space to come to terms with the strong waves of emotion they will go through and not feel crowded by our natural concern to immediately respond. Newman recognised the delicacy of each individual's circumstances and that we must be aware of these before we make contact. May St John Henry Newman teach us the stillness of compassion, combined with the generosity to act, as witnesses to the Gospel of Christ's healing and risen presence, to all who grieve.

LENT what are you giving up or taking on? Pray, fast, be generous, repent. Let Lent lift your Christian life! Make use of what's on offer.

ALWAYS REMEMBER THE BASIC COVID RULES
HANDS – sanitise, **FACE** – wear a face covering over mouth *and* nose, **SPACE** – stay 2 metres (or 6 feet) away from people not in your household. Please do not move the seats unless to move closer to a family member. **Seats must always be AT LEAST 2 metres from the aisle and the point of Communion and anyone else.**
VENTILATION – We must keep fresh air coming in. Please follow instructions from stewards – they are there to help make sure that these guidelines are followed.

FUNERALS: under the restrictions on all public Masses, **no more than 25 people**, stewards and cleaners needed.

CONFESSION: May be celebrated outdoors in a public space maintaining social distancing. Please ask the priests.

EMERGENCY PASTORAL CARE: This remains available of course, under the guidance given for the safety of all involved – carers, relatives, priest, **and** the person receiving the sacraments in an emergency. Routine sick visiting is very difficult: there is always a risk of any visitor (clergy or lay) unknowingly bringing Covid-19 with them or unknowingly taking it away to give to others.
