ALWAYS REMEMBER THE BASIC COVID RULES HANDS – sanitise, FACE – wear a face covering over mouth and nose, SPACE – stay AT LEAST I metre (or 3 feet) away from people not in your household. Friday Mass: 9.00am at STM followed by Exposition FR STEPHEN WRITES: AFTER LOCKDOWN... It is of course impossible to know the future! From Monday 19 July, our lives may possibly change quite a lot, if we are one of the people looking forward to release from restrictions. On the other hand, some of us will be more wary and need a little time to adjust to these changes. Some of us may even feel less than confident about changing anything just yet, given the statistics about the levels of infection. How ever we feel about the end of pandemic restrictions we must, first of all, understand other people's feelings and respect them. The Bishop's Conference has not yet issued any new guidelines. Ventilation, sanitiser, some use of face coverings and allowing people the space they feel comfortable with, will all be part of parish life. We have no way of knowing if July 19 will bring a great increase in church attendance, but we are preparing St Joseph's for that possibility.

On Wednesday 21 July, more seating will be brought into church and, after consideration and trying things out, returned to a more normal layout, bearing in mind likely demand, and the need to have space.

On Friday 23 July, weekday Masses will resume On Sunday 25 July, tea and coffee will be available after the 1045 Mass

We are not yet certain about music, servers and eucharistic ministers but these will come in due time.

To help with establishing what is possible and when, a questionnaire will be circulated asking if people would soon like to resume the roles they had, or if they'd like to wait a bit. It will also ask if anyone would like to take on something new. We start by circulating this in church because, obviously, those of you who come to Mass are prepared to be out and about, mixing with people. No one should feel any pressure whatever to make a commitment to doing something they'd rather not. We begin a more 'normal' existence just as the summer holidays are about to begin. This is no bad thing as it will clearly be best to come out of lockdown gently. Pray that we progress safely, steadily and happily.

FR PETER REFLECTS: One of the themes of the Diocesan Plan the Archbishop has asked us to focus on is Catholic lay leadership in the Church. Pope Francis in Let Us Dream remarks: "A sign of hope in (the present) crisis is the leading role of women. Women have been at the same time among the most affected and most resilient in this crisis. Affected, because they are more likely to be on the front line of the pandemic – about 70 percent of all those working in health care worldwide are women – but

also because they are harder hit economically while working in the informal or unpaid sector. The countries with women as presidents or prime ministers have on the whole reacted better and more quickly than others, making decisions swiftly and communicating them with empathy. What does this sign invite us to think about? What might the Spirit be saying to us? I think of the strength of the women in the Gospel following the death of Jesus. They were not paralyzed by the fear of tragedy, nor did they flee. For the love of the Master, they went to the tomb to anoint Him. Like so many women in this pandemic, they were able to hold it together, to get around obstacles in their path and keep hope alive in their families and community. Because they did so, they were the first to receive the astonishing news: "He is not here; for he has been raised" (Matthew 28:6). The Lord first announced the New Life to women because they were present, attentive, open to new possibilities. Could it be in this crisis the perspective women bring is what the world needs at this time to face the coming challenges? Could the Spirit be prompting us to recognize, value, and integrate fresh thinking that some women are bringing to this moment?" (p.62-63).
